Dear Friends,

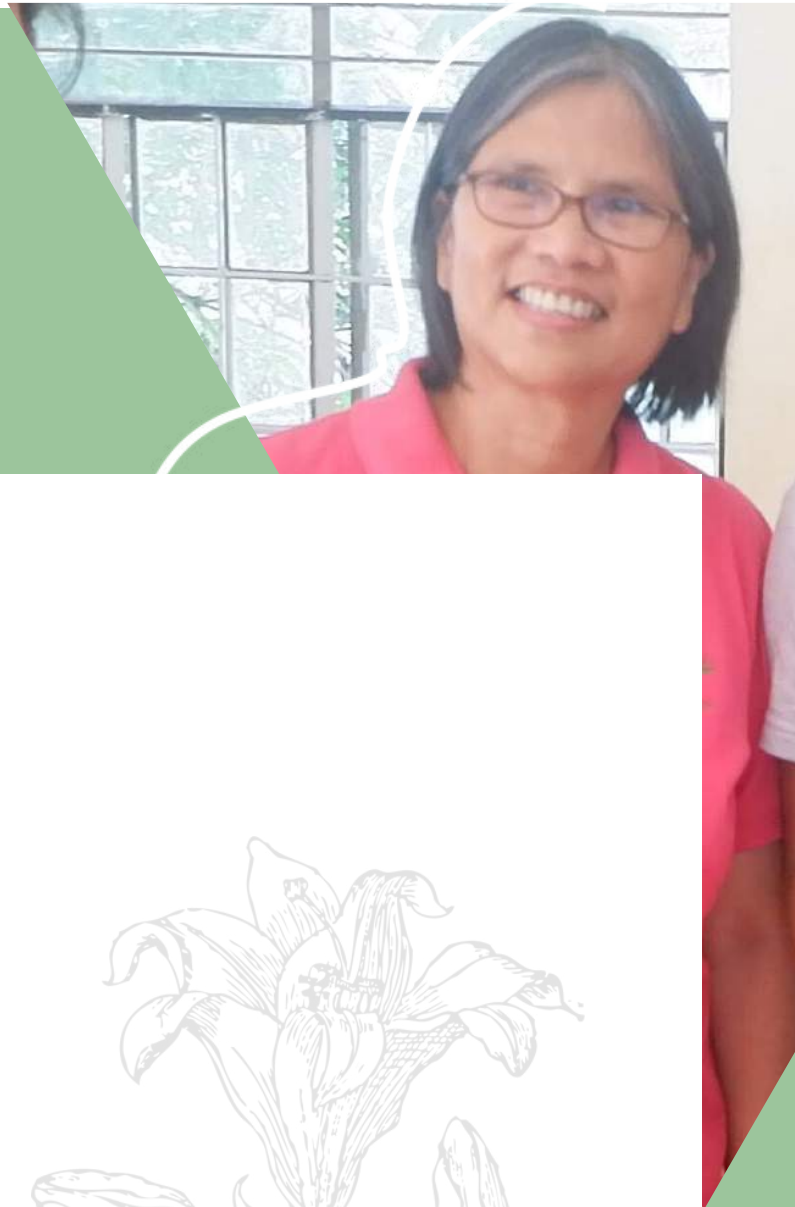

ORGANIZATION AT A GLANCE

We work with children in need of special protection and offer them programs and links to services. In 2019, there were

- 1,123 participants in street education sessions
- 319 participants in child protection sessions
- 67 children assisted with reintegration and provided with after care services
- 140 children and youth sheltered
- 90 youth facilitators
- 99 children in school
- 8 college scholars including 2 graduates
- 74 Social Enterprise Youth Associates
- 2504 students reached through KidsView

This year, we have worked for 32 years, in 3 centers, with 57 staff and 30 volunteers from 6 countries. The social enterprises run have produced:

- 6,640 kg of rice
- 6,203 kg of meat
- 3,309 kg of fruits and vegetables

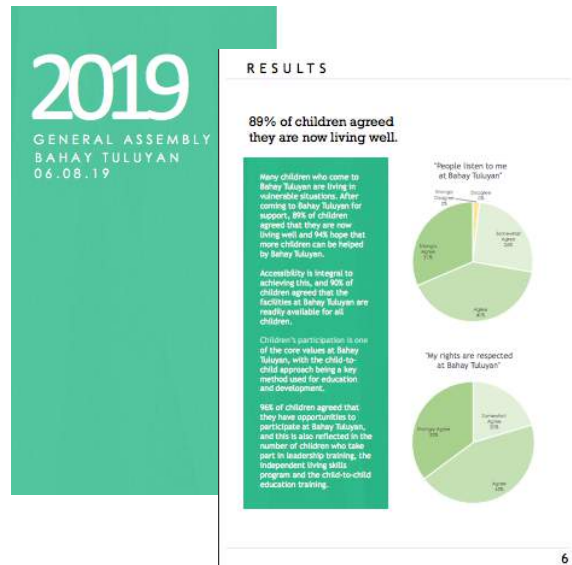


Children's General Assembly

The annual Bahay Tuluyan General Assembly brings together the BT community to enjoy a day of activities and reflection. It was held on the 8th of June at Bahay Tuluyan Laguna.

The 2019 event involved 96 children and youth from Manila, Laguna and Quezon, and provided a great opportunity for gathering feedback on Bahay Tuluyan's various programs.

The program included an introduction by the Executive Director, team building activities, presentation of Bahay Tuluyan programs, awarding ceremony, and feedback activities. For the first time, this year, the feedback gathered was compiled into the BT GA 2019 Report with the help of our volunteer Steph. The complete report is available at Bahay Tuluyan. Results were also presented by representative children themselves in one of BT's Board of Trustees meeting 3 months after the event.



- Some of the highlights from the online survey:
- 98% of children/youth felt that they were listened to at Bahay Tuluyan
 - 96% of children/youth felt they have opportunities to participate at Bahay Tuluyan
 - 94% of children/youth hope that more children can be helped by Bahay Tuluyan
 - 100% of children/youth felt their rights were respected at BT

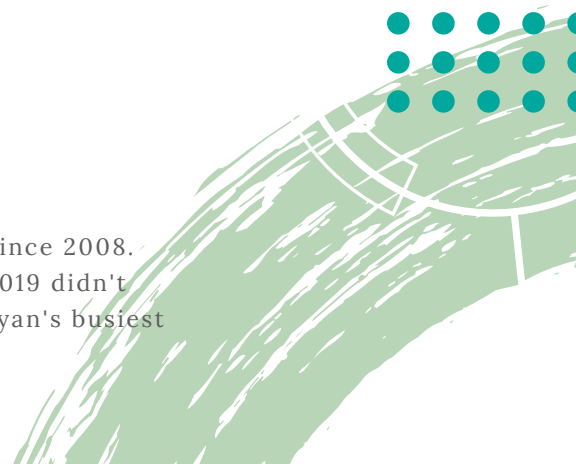

SPECIAL EVENTS

In April, after 14 weeks of immersion, community involvement and planning with Bahay Tuluyan, a group of medical students from Ateneo de Manila University completed the development of SafeTiki, a Child Protection Curriculum. The curriculum covers basic but important health and safety topics such as dental hygiene, proper handwashing, nutritious food, cyber safety, corporal punishment, and substance abuse. It also comes with a set of storybooks as accompanying teaching material. These were then used in the street education program and drop-in center activities of Bahay Tuluyan.

Children's Rights Institute



On November 29, in line with celebration of Children's Month and the 30th anniversary of the UNCRC, the Children's Rights Institute of Bahay Tuluyan was officially launched. Since the organization has been conducting various trainings in relation to children's rights in the past, the initiative to formalize efforts under an institute reflect a strengthened commitment to advocacy and furthering impact. Several training programs have already been credited as continuing professional development (CPD) for participating duty bearers. The first official activity was training on UN Guidelines for Alternative Care of Children.

During the week before Christmas, Christmas parties were held in each of the Bahay Tuluyan communities in Manila, Laguna, and Quezon. The celebration was an opportunity for all staff, volunteers, children and youth to gather and spend quality time with each other. Generous donors graced the occasion; for example, 300 bags of groceries from the Victory Church Malate were distributed to various children.

SPECIAL EVENTS

The 3rd Street Children's Congress (SCC) was a 3-day gathering of 47 street-connected children and youth affiliated with 7 different organizations. It was held from 22-24 February in Bahay Tuluyan Quezon. The participants learned and shared among themselves about the UNCRC General Comment on Children in Street Situations in relation to their own experiences. With the aid of music and art workshops facilitated by BT staff, they then collaborated in creating advocacy material about children's rights championing their own voices and stories.

International Day for Street Children



In celebration of International Day for Street Children (IDSC), an advocacy forum entitled "Dialogue with Street-Connected Children" was held on 12 April in Pan Pacific Hotel, Manila. It was attended by national and local government agencies, civil society representatives and the press; and featured the SCC participants' output, presented by youth representatives themselves. Reactions were given after each presentation and further discussion was done during the open forum. The event ended with a symbolic call for action where youth and duty-bearers alike came together in promise of solidarity.

Youth representatives presented narrative photography on equal treatment and child labor; a theater and spoken word performance on education and child protection; advocacy posters on health & disabilities and survival & development; a short film on basic needs in life and family connections; and a rap piece on participation & freedom and justice for children.



Partner children's rights organizations included the ACAP Philippine, Bridge Builder Foundation, Childhope Asia Philippines, Kuya Center, Sun for All Children, and Virlanie Foundation; and supporting organizations included the Canada Fund for Local Initiatives, Consortium for Street Children, Red Nose Day Foundation, ASMAE, AFD, Children's Rights Network and the Civil Society Coalition for the UNCRC.

SPECIAL EVENTS



The ChildSafe Movement is an international initiative that aims to protect children and youth from all forms of abuse and exploitation by creating awareness, conducting child protection training, and establishing partnerships. Since 2014, ChildSafe has worked with Bahay Tuluyan and the Philippine Department of Tourism to strengthen child protection practices in tourism. In 2019, this was formalized by signing a Memorandum of Understanding and strengthened with the launch of the "TourISM WorCs: Tourism Integrates, Supports, and Minds Women's Rights and Child Safety" campaign together with Bahay Tuluyan, other partner NGOs and LGUs.

As implementing partner for ChildSafe in the Philippines, BT helps facilitate DOT Child Safe Tourism trainings which target the different businesses in the tourism industry and promotes awareness about child protection policies especially in relation to tourism activities.

Resilient Children

STREET EDUCATION AND SUPPORT

Improve the capacity of children living or working on the street to protect themselves from abuse or violence through the provision of services, support and protection

CASE MANAGEMENT & MONITORING

Registered social workers provided assistance to children and families on the street through process of case management and case monitoring:

- 14 children provided with medical assistance
- 114 children assisted with legal concerns
- 45 children provided with psycho-social assistance
- 11 children assisted with educational needs
- 40 children given access to emergency shelter
- 32 children provided with family assistance
- 19 children helped to transition off the street

STREET EDUCATION SESSIONS

In 2019, Bahay Tuluyan provided street education in 3 locations:

Out of the 1123 children who joined the street education sessions, 232 children attended more than half the total number of sessions

- 57 Youth Facilitators were involved

Resilient Children

DROP-IN CENTER

Provide a place for children in need of special protection to play, learn, seek refuge, access support services, develop their skills and engage in community activities



CASE MANAGEMENT AND MONITORING

Registered social workers provided assistance to children and families through process of case management and case monitoring:

- 22 children provided with medical assistance
- 17 children assisted with legal concerns
- 9 children provided with psycho-social assistance
- 22 children assisted with educational needs
- 33 children given access to emergency shelter
- 31 children provided with family assistance
- 21 children helped to transition off the street

CHILD PROTECTION SESSIONS

The Drop In Center was open and accessible to children on most weekdays. In 2019, out of the 319 children who attended the day-to-day sessions, 187 children attended more than half the total number of sessions

- 30 Youth Facilitators were involved
- 73% of active participants were able to identify accessible avenues for help

BRIDGE & FORMAL EDUCATION

Assist children in need of special protection to access bridge or formal education and provide opportunities to enhance children's educational development



Children also have all-year access to learning spaces and tutorials in BT. Learning spaces are filled with donated books, chairs, tables, and computers for doing their homework while tutorials are done by volunteers and houseparents.

YOUTH LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

Empowering children and youth to be socially responsible leaders and advocates of children's rights

JUNIOR EDUCATORS PROGRAM

Out of the 62 youth who have attended at least one session, 28 youth had active participation in the Junior Educators Program Batch 14. These children were given training on children's rights and child-to-child approach.

Participants of the Junior Educator's Program were given self-assessment forms to get a sense of their current level of self-awareness, leadership skills, and communication and planning skills.

Overall improvement was seen particularly in the participants 1) having confidence in their capability to stand as a leader and role model for fellow children and 2) seeing self-care as important.



YOUTH FACILITATION TRAINING

Youth facilitators have been a vibrant part of Bahay Tuluyan, leading to many activities for children and youth. In 2019, a total of 90 youth were involved in facilitation, including 67 from Manila, 11 from Laguna, and 12 from Quezon

YOUTH CHANGEMAKERS PROGRAM

Empowering children and youth to be socially responsible leaders and advocates of children's rights

CHILDREN'S COUNCIL AND PILAK

Children's Councils are operational in Laguna and Quezon. These children were involved in organizing events and in working with staff to plan and improve programs. The names of the current officers are listed on page 7, under Governance. Due to the transient nature of the shelter in Manila, children's participation in decision making is done through youth facilitators and PILAK, Bahay Tuluyan's Youth Advocacy Group.

COMMUNITY DAYS

58 youth from Bahay Tuluyan organized 19 Community Days for a total of 331 children in 2019. These days were an opportunity for children from the community to participate in fun and educational activities, with the purpose of increasing their understanding of children's rights.

- Laguna - 6 days, 70 participants
- Quezon - 2 day, 50 participants

INDEPENDENT LIVING SKILLS PROGRAM

Empowering children and youth to be socially responsible leaders and advocates of children's rights.

ILSP MODULAR TRAINING

A total of 18 youth (15 yo +) were involved in ILSP modular training this 2019. These training sessions are run on a regular basis throughout the year.

A three-week ILSP camp was held from 6-31 May 2019. A total of 18 youth (from Manila, Laguna, and Quezon) were involved in this camp which gave them intensive exposure to activities that encouraged them to develop life skills.

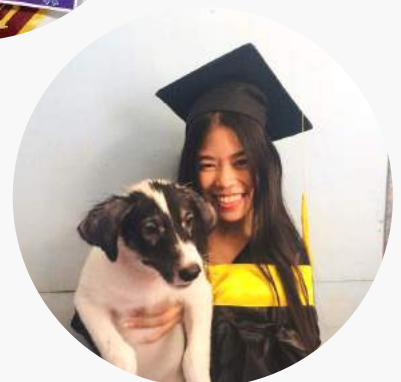

GROUP HOME

In each of Quezon and Laguna, group homes are throughout the year. In these homes, young people (15 yo+) live semi-independently. There have been a total of 35 young people involved in this program in 2019 - Laguna (6) and Quezon (29). 8 children were assisted into independent living outside Bahay Tuluyan.

SOCIAL ENTERPRISE & SELF RELIANCE

Enable youth to be more self-reliant and enable Bahay Tuluyan to generate income to increase its financial sustainability

BANK ACCOUNT AND SAVINGS

Children and youth connected with Bahay Tuluyan were assisted to open and maintain bank accounts. A total of 93 children and youth were engaged in this program and saved a cumulative amount of PHP 452,815.

SOCIAL ENTERPRISE YOUTH ASSOCIATES (SEYA) PROGRAM

The Social Enterprise Youth Associates Program was run in Manila through the Makabata Guesthouse and Cafe initiated in 2016. The program is in its beginning stages in Laguna and Quezon . A total of 74 youth were engaged and a cumulative amount of PHP 2,471,553 was earned in 2019.



MAKABATA GUESTHOUSE & CAFE

The Makabata Guesthouse & Cafe is in its ninth year of operations. This year, the average occupancy of the guesthouse was 47% and the gross income generated was PHP 5,118,029.62.

BT ECO CULTURAL ENCOUNTERS

During 2019, youth from Bahay Tuluyan ran "Vibrant Community Tours" in the area of Malate, Manila. These tours provided visitors with an insight into community life, food and transport.

In Quezon, the youth ran "Tree of Life Tours." The tour focused on the products of the coconut tree.

BAHAY TULUYAN NATURE FARMS

Bahay Tuluyan Nature Farms in both Laguna and Quezon continue to grow in farming potential. In 2019, the following products were produced through natural farming techniques:

QUEZON

- Rice - 6640 kg
- Pork - 1706 kg
- Chicken - 2274 kg
- Fruits & vegetables - 1504 kg

LAGUNA

- Pork - 458 kg
- Chicken - 1765 kg
- Fruits & vegetables - 1805 kg

A total revenue of PHP 1,999,415 was generated through this social enterprise



RECREATE PHILIPPINES

Recreate Philippines is a line of upcycled jewelry created by local children and their communities. In 2019, Recreate Philippines had a gross income of PHP 31,802.



Safe Families

FAMILY SUPPORT & REINTEGRATION

Provide support to children to enable them to stay in their families or be reintegrated into their families

ASSISTANCE PROVIDED TO FAMILIES

In 2019, the following services were facilitated by registered social workers on a case-to-case basis:

- Family retreat
- Food assistance (groceries)
- Educational assistance (allowances, school supplies, transportation allowance)
- Housing assistance (rental)
- Counseling
- Legal assistance
- Paralegal assistance
- Referral to government services
- Employment or work opportunities

REINTEGRATION AND AFTER CARE

A total of 67 children were reintegrated with their families or into independent living in 2019 and/or assisted with after care services.

ALTERNATIVE FAMILY CARE

Provide quality rights-based alternative family care as a last resort and for the shortest possible time for children without safe family environments

PROVISION OF SHELTER

A total of 130 children were sheltered at Bahay Tuluyan in 2019.

- Manila - 43
- Laguna - 37
- Quezon - 60

**CASE MANAGEMENT**

All children in shelter were case managed by registered social workers with the goal of helping the children reintegrate into family or independent living.

In 2019, 92% of children in shelter had regular contact with their family. 95% of children had individual treatment plans being used to address their needs and monitor their well-being. 88% of children have shown increased resilience through the CYRM.

The average length of stay of children in shelters as of this reporting period is 1 year and 3 months. 92% of children stayed in Alternative Family Care for less than 3 years.
