A MESSAGE FROM THE ED

Throughout the 34-year history of Bahay Tuluyan's work, resilience has been a constant, underlying theme and driving force. In 2021 this resilience came to the fore, allowing us to create significant and important impacts in the lives of young people, despite significant challenges.

Throughout 2021 the COVID-19 pandemic continued to cause great hardship to the children, youth, families and communities with whom we work. School closures, restricted mobility, financial pressures and fractured support networks added strain for everyone. Heartbreakingly for many children and youth these compounding circumstances led to, or added to, the devastation of neglect, abuse and violence.

However this year we also saw vaccinations start to turn the tide for the pandemic. At Bahay Tuluyan, this hope spurred us to look for new ways to adapt and serve. A powerful example of this is the 51 young people underwent adapted vocational training in our Makabata Guesthouse and Cafe, forced to remain closed. 21 of these were young mothers, facing the compounding challenges of parenting at a young age, with limited education and during a pandemic. The positive impact of the program on these young women, and their children, has inspired us to look for more ways to serve this sector.

2021 was also a period of digital transformation. While many of our children, youth and employees started the year with limited computer literacy, the need to work remotely provided impetus to level up. Before this year we could never have imagined showing our international friends around our farms virtually, providing online tutorials to our children, running a national Street Children's Congress online or setting up and running a fundraising campaign entirely through social media. Our new gained skills have set us up to move forward confidently, collaboratively and efficiently.

There are so many more examples of how we have managed to collaborate and overcome. Those stories are written in these pages. But the true impact of what we have achieved is written in the lives and stories of those we have served.

We are proud of what we have accomplished and so grateful for our many friends, supporters, partners and donors for helping us make 2021 a year of growth and impact.

ORGANIZATION AT A GLANCE

During 2021 Bahay Tuluyan reached 34 years of providing programs and services to children in need of special protection. We operated from 3 centers and 2 satellite centers and our workforce comprised of 33 staff and 7 local and foreign volunteers.

This year, there were:

- 79 participants in child protection and safety sessions
- 46 participants of Children Rights Advocacy Training
- 71 preschool, elementary and high school scholars
- 9 college scholars including 1 graduate
- 63 children and youth sheltered
- 11 children and youth reintegrated to family and into independent living
- 32 children and youth provided with after care services
- 50 families provided with family assistance
- 90 Social Enterprise Youth Associates (SEYA) trained at Makabata Guesthouse and Cafe and Bahay Tuluyan Nature Farms

Bahay Tuluyan Nature Farms produced:

- 4,100 kg of rice
- 1,200 kg of meat
- 1,900 kg of fruits and vegetables

We are committed to building a world where every child's rights are respected, protected and fulfilled.

MISSION

We are a children's rights organization that believes in the dignity of all children. We work to prevent and respond to abuse and violence against children and to ensure all children's rights are fulfilled and protected. We work in dynamic collaboration with and empowerment of children, youth, families and the community.

RESILIENT CHILDREN

DROP IN CENTER (DIC)

Objective: Children in street situations have improved developmental outcomes, improved access to services and are better equipped with skills to protect themselves from abuse or violence.

While the Drop In Center continued to be closed this year, the new Safe Tiki Safety Education curriculum is well underway. Modules were divided into themes according to the 6 categories of rights contained in the United Nations Convention of the Rights of the Child.

The new curriculum which aims to be more age-appropriate and responsive to the emerging needs of the children is due for finalization in January 2021. Meanwhile, the Drop In Center was regularly cleaned and underwent repairs to prepare for face-to-face sessions once Covid-19 cases stabilized and quarantine restrictions eased.



RESILIENT CHILDREN

STREET EDUCATION AND SUPPORT

Objective: Children do not need to rely on the street to live or be safe and while on the street they are as safe and healthy as possible.

With the quarantine restrictions constantly changing and Covid-19 cases increasing, on site street education was postponed for the whole year. Children and youth involved in this program for the past years were assisted with online academic tutorials to help with their transition to virtual learning. Sessions also included topics on recognizing and reporting abuse, physical and online safety, and caring for mental health in time of the pandemic.

A total of 79 children and youth were reached through this program this year. Out of the 57 children who joined the sessions, 38 children (67%) attended at least half the total number of sessions. A special 3-day information session on Online Sexual Exploitation of Children (OSEC) for 22 newly reached children was conducted in December.

A dedicated group of 4 youth facilitators handled the 26 one hour sessions per area and per grade level from January to August. 6 community volunteers were tapped to reach out to children in their respective areas and update the social worker whenever children were having difficulties with the sessions.

RESILIENT CHILDREN

BRIDGE AND FORMAL EDUCATION

Objective: Children are achieving their educational potential through access to bridge, alternative, supplementary and formal education.

A total of 71 children and youth in shelter and in supported independent living were assisted to continue their education through modular and/or online learning. Access to learning spaces within the centers was provided. In both Laguna and Quezon centers, there were library/ activity areas and dedicated computer areas. These learning spaces were filled with donated books, chairs, tables, and computers where children could do their homework and school projects. One-on-one and group tutorials were provided by program staff and house parents and youth facilitators for younger children.

Formal & Alternative Education

63 children and youth were enrolled and continued their studies in formal education from Kindergarten to Senior High School with 51 children successfully completing the school year. 8 children were supported to study under the Alternative Learning System (ALS) with 2 children mainstreamed in to formal education. 2 children were studying under Special Education (SPED).

Bridge Education

Of those supported in formal education, 25% were behind their DepEd standard grade level by more than a 4-year gap. Tutorials were provided to these students to help them catch up with schooling. Where appropriate, alternatives to formal education were provided to help close this gap.



YOUTH LEADERSHIP FOR CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

Objective: Children and youth are empowered to defend their own rights and the rights of other children as socially responsible leaders and advocates.

Children Rights Advocacy Training (CRAT)

Implementation of the CRAT curriculum started this year with topics finalized after a number of consultation and planning meetings with children, youth, and staff. The first three modules were run for a total of 46 children and youth in Laguna and Quezon centers. Topics were Personality Development and Introduction to, Recognizing, and Reporting Online Sexual Exploitation of Children (OSEC).

Similar with the SafeTiki Safety Curriculum, the CRAT curriculum is divided into the 6 categories of rights in the UNCRC and was designed to be age appropriate. Sessions for children and youth are targeted at 5 different age groups namely Safe Tiki Champions (0 - 6 yo), Kids Rights Ambassadors (7 - 10 yo), Junior Changemakers (11 - 14 yo), Peer Advocates (15 - 18 yo), and Rights Defenders (19yo+).

Module development for the remaining topics is ongoing.







YOUTH LEADERSHIP FOR CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

Objective: Children and youth are empowered to defend their own rights and the rights of other children as socially responsible leaders and advocates.

Leadership Training

The 14 children's council members elected in June were involved in a two-day leadership training in June which equipped them with basic leadership skills and helped them to develop their plans of action for 2021.

YOUTH LEADERSHIP FOR CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

Objective: Children are able to enhance BT's work through meaningful participation in program development, implementation, monitoring and evaluation.



Children's Councils & Assemblies

This year, children's councils were operational in Laguna and Quezon centers. The council organized activities for children and staff including Family Days, sports league and daily Zumba exercises, general cleaning of center, and holiday and monthly birthday celebrations. They also participated in regular meetings with the staff to plan and improve programs and address children's issues.

Three children's quarterly assemblies were held for each of Laguna and Quezon centers and a General Assembly for all children and youth involved in BT activities for the year was done through combined online and face-to-face methods in the 3 centers in October.

Children's safety from physical, verbal, and emotional threats were discussed during the quarterly assemblies from prevention and reporting of abuse to everyone's responsibility of taking care of personal and the center's properties and surroundings to limit accidents and sickness.

During the General Assembly, children and youth were able to evaluate BT program's through creative outputs. The children's councils also presented a summary of the activities they headed for the year and their plans for the remaining months of their term including training sessions on Bullying, Reproductive Health and Personality Development. They also aim to come up with crafts they can sell to generate income while continuing the already started council-led activities.

Career Guidance & Work Experience

A total of 121 youth were assisted with planning and preparation for their chosen career paths:

- 82 youth were assisted with resume creation
- 68 youth had experienced mock job interviews
- 83 youth were provided with one-on-one career guidance to explore one's strengths and various work fields
- 5 youth worked in various BT offices and centers as interns for at least 1 week

Supported Independent Living

A total of 6 youth living outside the center were provided with housing assistance. In Quezon, 17 youth were living in group homes semi-independently, to prepare them for independent living or reintegration to their families.

INDEPENDENT LIVING SKILLS PROGRAM

Objective: Youth have holistic skills and experience to enable them to lead productive, healthy and happy adult lives

Holistic Modular Training

A total of 20 sessions were conducted this quarter for youth in each of Laguna and Quezon centers and 10 sessions for each batch of youth in Manila undergoing SEYA training. Topics included Personality Development, Career Planning, Money Management and Reproductive Health.

Out of the 93 youth who joined the sessions, 72 (77%) youth attended at least half of the sessions.

In 2021, 10 monthly webinars on career paths, mental health awareness, student motivation, family relationships, gender differences and issues on drug use and abuse were participated by a total of 55 youth.

Pre-ILSP: "Smart Girls"

An initiative supported by Girl Fund of the EMpower Foundation which aimed to adapt BT's existing ILSP to cater to the expressed needs of 10-14 year old girls began this year. 8 girls from Laguna and 20 girls from a government-run shelter in Marikina City participated in a series of trainings they helped to conceptualize. The program received positive feedback from the participants including improved self-confidence and sensitivity to the needs of their peers. The participants requested that the program be continued. As such, this will officially be part of ILSP next year as Life Skills Education which will involve all 10 - 14 year old children in BT centers.



SOCIAL ENTERPRISE & SELF RELIANCE

Objective: Youth have agricultural or hospitality skills and are transitioning into work effectively because they have practical experience and are responsible and disciplined.

Social Enterprise Youth Associates (SEYA)

A total of 90 youth were engaged in SEYA training this quarter. The SEYA Agriculture Training held at Bahay Tuluyan Nature Farms was participated in by 31 youth. The process of developing the curriculum for this training was ongoing.

The SEYA Hospitality Training held at Makabata Guesthouse and Cafe was delivered through 8-week intensive small group coursese while Manila remained under community quarantine. Four batches finished this year with a total of 51 participants - 22 of whom were young mothers and 29 out of school youth.

A major impact of the training was increased knowledge and skills relating to housekeeping and kitchen duties and improved behavior in terms of dealing with clients and relating to peers, based on participant's self-assessment at the end of their training.

Youth Savings

Out of the 31 SEYA involved in BT Nature Farms, 24 youth had saved a cumulative amount of PHP 138,700 by the end of this year.

Since training at Makabata Guesthouse was done intensively, SEYA allowances were released weekly and savings were withdrawn by the participants prior to their respective graduations.





SOCIAL ENTERPRISE & SELF RELIANCE

Objective: 30% of BT's operational expenses are generated through social enterprise.

Makabata Guesthouse & Cafe

The Makabata Guesthouse and Cafe remained closed for occupancy in accordance with quarantine guidelines. A total of PHP 803,291.20 gross revenue was generated through limited permitted accommodation, product sales, training room rentals and catering.

Bahay Tuluyan Nature Farms

A total revenue of PHP 1,073,486 was generated through this social enterprise.



SAFE FAMILIES

FAMILY SUPPORT & REINTEGRATION

Objective: At-risk families are supported to stay together wherever possible.

Family Assistance

In 2021, a total of 50 families were assisted with the following services facilitated by registered social workers on a case-to-case basis:

- Food assistance (groceries)
- Educational assistance (allowances, school supplies, gadgets for online classes)
- Housing assistance (rental)
- Counseling
- Legal assistance
- Paralegal assistance
- Referral to government services
- Compensated volunteer work
- Pap smear tests and family planning sessions with an obstetrician-gynecologist at Alameda Medical and Dental Clinic, through the support of Curally

Emergency Shelter

In Laguna and Manila, 2 children and 1 adult were provided with emergency shelter from rescue operations, spending an average of three nights in the centers.



Family Development Sessions

In Manila, 15 mothers participated in 3 Family Development sessions. The first session was done in partnership with Sunflower Foundation to assess family situations in time of pandemic. Session 2 and 3 were facilitated by KASAGANA-KA Mutual Benefit Association, Inc. where participants learned about basic financial literacy as well as insurance and other services offered by the organization.



SAFE FAMILIES

FAMILY SUPPORT & REINTEGRATION

Objective: Children and youth are reintegrated into safe families or supportive environments.



Reintegration

A total of 9 children were reintegrated to their families during this year, with various others being prepared for reintegration. 2 youth were reintegrated to Independent Living where they continued their education and worked part time.

The rate of reintegration was relatively slow in 2021 due to the impact of COVID-19 restrictions on families and overall operations and logistics.

After Care

A total of 32 children and youth were provided with after care services including counselling and financial and educational support on a case by case basis.

94% of the children and youth reintegrated since 2020 continue to live with their families and relatives. 41% of school age children continued their studies. Reasons for the decision to stop schooling included limited or lack of educational guidance and support from family, online connectivity issues and access to devices for online classes.



SAFE FAMILIES

ALTERNATIVE FAMILY CARE

Children without safe family environments are provided with quality, rights-based alternative family care.

Home Life

In 2021, a total of 61 children and youth were admitted and sheltered at BT.

The shelter's staff to children ratio was an average of 1 is to no more than 5 children. Small ratios helped with providing direct and warm social interaction between house parents and children.

Case Management

All children in shelter were case managed by registered social workers with the goal of helping the children reintegrate into family or independent living.

In 2021, BT used the Child and Youth Resilience Measure (CRYM) and Child Rights Based Assessment of Protective Factors to monitor changes in children's resilience and wellbeing.

The average length of stay of children in shelters as of this reporting period is 2 years and 4 months. 34% of children stayed in Alternative Family Care for less than 2 years.

Development Activities

Aside from center-wide activities like Family Days and holiday celebrations organized by the children's council, house parents and program staff prepared a variety of day to day activities for children in small groups. These included, but were not limited to, arts and crafts, free and structured play times, tutorials, cooking. gardening and story telling activities.



CHILD-FRIENDLY COMMUNITIES

CHILDREN'S RIGHTS EDUCATION

Children's rights duty-bearers are educated about children's issues and have improved capacity to respect, protect and fulfill children's rights.




Children's Rights Institute

Bahay Tuluyan aims to conduct children's rights education at various levels and with various target populations. This is primarily done by running trainings and workshops under the Children's Rights Institute social enterprise, which reaches out to educate dutybearers in the hope of improving their capacity to respect, protect, and fulfill children's rights.

A total of 143 participants directly working with children participated in 4 training workshops conducted this 2021.

- Children's Rights Programming for ASMAE, 23 February, 20 participants,
- Children's Rights Programming (online), 28-30 July, 66 participants
- Children's Rights Programming (online) for CRC Coalition, 27-28 Sept, 24 participants
- Children's Rights Programming (online) 29 Sept-1 Oct, 33 participants

94% of the participants reported that training sessions were moderately or very useful for their work.



CHILD-FRIENDLY COMMUNITIES

CHILDREN'S RIGHTS ADVOCACY & RESEARCH

Objective: Children are protected because effective policy and legal frameworks are in place, duty-bearers are held accountable and the society is sensitive to social justice issues affecting children.

Research

In 2021, BT initiated a research study on the rescue narratives of children in street situations funded by Red Nose Day USA through the Consortium for Street Children. Talks with the University of the Philippines and Consuelo Foundation led to an agreement for the University to take over the research and BT to contribute data by organizing BT's child and youth partners to be respondents of the research.

Awareness Raising

In 2021, Bahay Tuluyan participated in the following online events and output:

- Online International Day for Children in Street Situations (CiSS) including launch of Philippine National Multi Sectoral Strategic Plan for CISS, 12 April
- Child Rights Network's Kids Speak Up video on children's message to the president in his last year as the nation's leader, 26 July
- Council for the Welfare of Children's virtual forum titled Walang Batang Maiiwan in celebration of National Children's Month, 24 November

Various social media posts were shared on BT's FB page to raise awareness about social issues affecting children in the Philippines including a documentary on CiSS, approval of bills on adoption and alternative care and on raising the age to determine statutory rape, and infographics on children's rights, which reached an average of more than 1,000 views per post based on FB statistics.

ChildSafe Tourism

In partnership with Friends International and Childhood Foundation, a ChildSafe orientation for 30 tourism frontliners in Boracay was held on 9 December.

3000 copies of the 7 Tips for Travelers in the Philippines were produced.

Campaigns and Legislative Reforms

In 2021, Bahay Tuluyan was involved in the following efforts for legislative development:

- Participation in technical working group on Domestic Administrative Adoption Bill which was approved in House on 28 July 2021
- Contribution to the development of Child Friendly Protocol for Children in War on Drugs & Drug Education with Save the Children

CHILD-FRIENDLY COMMUNITIES



Congress for Children in Street Situations

This year, the Congress for Children in Street Situations (CiSS) was held online via Zoom on 3 half day Saturday sessions. The event was organized and facilitated by Street Children's Congress representatives of BT from 2019 and current officers of BT Children's Councils who had street connections and experiences. A total of 65 current and former CiSS from 21 NGOs and youth-led organizations all over the Philippines participated in discussions and activities which tackled the United Nations General Comment 21 on CiSS and the current issues faced by CiSS. Experiences and data shared and gathered during the Congress will be raised to relevant duty bearers in next year's celebration of the International Day for CiSS and whenever opportunities arise.

KidsView

This year the annual KidsView tour, run in partnership with Bahay Tuluyan Philippines Australia, was not able to proceed due to COVID restrictions. Instead, adaptations were made to allow for online forums to be run involving children and staff from Bahay Tuluyan in the Philippines presenting to Australian students online.

A total of 7 online events were held reaching 5 schools and more than 400 Australian students.

FARM TOURS


In April, Bahay Tuluyan's Tree of Life Tour moved online - running its first tour via Zoom for a Japanese study tour group. This started the transition of farm tours to an online set up. In celebration of the Earth Day on April 22, an online forum organized and prepared by youth and staff of BT Laguna and Quezon was attended by more than 20 partners and friends of BT. The hour long event was packed with video tours in Laguna and Quezon, live testimonials from the youth about life at the farm and the importance of the environment. With the success of this forum, a similar one held in celebration of Environment Day on June 5 was advertised online which received more than 30 registrants. Funds raised from the forum went to further farm development.

ROOFTOP GARDEN

In April, a partnership with BPI Bayan Project was established to jump-start the rooftop garden at Makabata Guesthouse and Cafe. The team provided Bahay Tuluyan with funds to create garden plots, soil, and seedlings. They also partnered with Bureau of Plant Industries to provide BT with 400 mushroom fruiting bags, additional seeds and relevant garden tools and equipment. From July to December, the garden produced various crops including kangkong, pechay, radish, okra, eggplant, and mushroom. The produce were mainly consumed by children in Manila center but was also brought to Laguna and Quezon centers.





INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

In an initiative to stay connected with our friends and partners during the extended COVID lockdowns, Bahay Tuluyan organized various online forums during 2021. The first of these was held on International Women's Day on 8 March 2022 and featured 3 women connected to Bahay Tuluyan (one child leader - Mariz Penaradonda, one youth leader and young mother - Kim Jacinto and one employee/community leader - Lilet Tupas). These women shared their experiences of thoughts and experiences on topical issues facing Filipino women including teen pregnancies, abuse and violence and misogyny. The theme was 'Choose to Challenge'.

CHILDREN'S MONTH

Children and youth in Laguna and Quezon centers spent a whole day enjoying games and activities in celebration of Children's Month in November. In Laguna, children met with participants from various organizations online and shared about their rights and needs given the Covid-19 situation through a poster making contest hosted by ABSNET. In Quezon, the celebration's theme focused on responding to children's rights in the new normal.

REACHING RAINBOWS FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN

The #ReachingRainbowsBT was a #GivingTuesday campaign which ran from 30 November to 6 December 2021 aiming to raise 1 million pesos to support food, shelter, education and health care for children Bahay Tuluyan supports. The collaborative effort of the staff, children, and youth from planning, preparation of materials, reaching out to donors, and conducting a live event and the overwhelming support from the public made the campaign a success. A total of 2,370,127 million pesos was raised - more than double the campaign goal!

CHRISTMAS CELEBRATION

A 3-part Christmas Celebration was held this year for all children and youth admitted in BT centers, children involved with the online child protection sessions in Manila and their families, and youth involved in SEYA trainings in Manila. Even with face masks on, everyone shared laughter and smiles during games and activities. Each celebration ended with gift giving and wishes of a merry Christmas for everyone.
