A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As 2022 began we were still in the grip of the COVID-19 pandemic. Our movements were restricted in many ways and this impacted on nearly every aspect of our lives. It wasn't until around the middle of 2022 that most restrictions had been lifted and life could return somewhat to 'normal'.

At Bahay Tuluyan we continued, as we had since 2020, to adapt, to the constantly changing circumstances. We found ways to fill the gaps where our normal programs could not operate - online tutorials, webinars, small-group activities. We also learnt to innovate as new challenges emerged - rising cases of online sexual abuse & exploitation of children, changing political administrations, the challenges of 're-emerging' from extended lockdowns.

Despite the changes all around us, our strategic direction stayed consistent and we continued to be guided by our vision of a world where every child's rights are respected, protected and fulfilled. The pressing issues that inspired this vision - abuse, violence, poverty, exploitation, neglect - continued to challenge us to work towards sustainable solutions that could ultimately shift the playing field towards a more child friendly world.

Our programs and scope continued to be ambitious - 10 programs, 3 centers, 3 social enterprises including 4 farms. There were many times that I wondered if we had bitten off more than we could chew. But the call to respond to emerging needs was strong and our changemakers determined. With an exceptional cohort of staff, volunteers, funders, supporters and partners we have managed to continue to deliver and grow in our commitment to children, youth, families and the community.

We are extremely grateful to everyone who has been part of our journey, not only in 2022 but for the past 35 years - your support has allowed what you read about here to happen. We hope that you enjoy reading about Bahay Tuluyan's accomplishments in 2022 and continue to grow with us.

We are committed to building a world where every child's rights are respected, protected and fulfilled.

MISSION

We are a children's rights organization that believes in the dignity of all children. We work to prevent and respond to abuse and violence against children and to ensure all children's rights are fulfilled and protected. We work in dynamic collaboration with and empowerment of children, youth, families and the community.

GOALS

- Empowering at least 8,000 children to develop increased resilience and reduced vulnerability through the provision of child-centred, rightsbased programs and services.
- Empowering at least 900 youth to be safe and healthy and to develop their potential to be independent, socially responsible members of the community.
- Assisting at least 400 children to live in safe family environments and helping at least 470 families reunite and/or stay together.
- Enabling child-friendly communities by capacitating at least 4,500 duty-bearers, strengthening systems and actively promoting children's rights locally, nationally and internationally.
- Being a leader in the field of children's rights, always learning, transparent, accountable and self-reliant, working towards generating at least 30% of our operational costs through social enterprises that promote youth empowerment.










OUR PARTICIPANTS

This year we reached a total of 1,180 direct individual participants across all of our programs. Each program and activity had a different target group, depending on the program's objectives. Some participants were involved in more than one program.

2% of the child and youth participants we worked with had a confirmed or suspected disability. 12% were from the

minority Muslim population.

The child and youth participants in our programs generally fell into one of the following

categories:

- Survivor of, or at risk of abuse/violence, neglect or exploitation
- Homeless
- In conflict with the law

The adult participants in our programs fell into the following categories:

- Parent, relative or guardian of child, youth served by Bahay Tuluyan
- · Government or nongovernment duty bearer working, or with impact on children and youth



STREET EDUCATION & SUPPORT

Program Objective - Assist children in street situations to access services and improve knowledge and skills for staying safe and healthy

COVID restrictions impacted the implementation of the Street **Education & Support program** during 2022. Face to face activities began in February and were conducted in small groups at BT Manila. By August the team was able to conduct operations in our 4 areas on a weekly basis.

2137 children participated in 118 Safe Tiki Street Education (STSE) sessions and received support and assistance from a social worker.

BRIDGE & FORMAL EDUCATION

Program Objective - Support children to achieve their educational potential

Until May 2022 schools remained almost entirely closed to face to face education and BT scholars were supported with modular or online education. Schools gradually reopened in September for the 2022-2023 school year.

BT supported 96 children and youth to access education, including through the provision of financial support, school liaison, tutorials and the provision of school supplies.

BRIDGE & FORMAL EDUCATION

'When we came to BT, it was a really big thing. I learnt to read. Me and my older sister had other mothers to help us look after our little brothers and sisters....

DROP-IN CENTER

Program Objective - Improve children's access to services and equip children with skills to protect themselves from abuse and violence

COVID restrictions prevented the Drop-In Center from operating as usual during 2022. Instead, the Center was used to run activities organized under other programs, including Safe Tiki Safety Education, Children's Rights Ambassador Training and Life Skills Education.



YOUTH LEADERSHIP FOR CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

Program Objective - Empower children and youth to participate actively and to become socially responsible leaders and advocates

Children's Rights Ambassador Training

102 children and youth from Manila, Laguna and Quezon participated in agebased Children's Rights Ambassador Training aimed at increasing knowledge about children's rights and issues as well as developing leadership skills.

The curriculum was based on topics identified by the children and youth and was organized around the six categories in the 'rainbow of rights' in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child

YOUTH LEADERSHIP FOR CHILDREN'S RIGHTS

Children's Leadership

Children and youth participated in decision making through various different mechanisms during 2022. 7 Quarterly Assemblies were held in the various centers of Bahay Tuluyan during which children and youth met with management to share their ideas, concerns and plans. On 22 October 101 children and youth gathered in Manila for the annual children's General Assembly. This very productive day provided much valued feedback and input.

138 young people voted in annual elections of Children's Councils in each center. All elected council members underwent leadership training in September. Council leaders met with the Board of Trustees once during 2022.

Youth organised and ran 4 community days and 3 pop-up library sessions as well as participated in revising BT's Child Protection Policy and developing its Anti-Bullying Policy.

13 youth leaders from BT participated in training and community consultations with ASMAE, 1 youth trained as a leader through the Consuelo Youth Advocates Network and 1 youth participated in Kalitwahan Network Children's Meeting









INDEPENDENT LIVING SKILLS PROGRAM

Program Objective - Support youth to develop skills, knowledge and experience so they can lead happy, healthy, productive adult lives

Social Inclusion

168 children and youth were assisted to secure documents for social inclusion including birth certificates (35), national ID (151), SSS membership (41) and Paglbig membership (25)

Life Skills Education

64 children (10 - 14 yo) participated in 73 Life Skills Education Jr sessions. 198 youth (15 - 19 yo) participated in Life Skills Education Sr sessions. There were 42 participants in 2 ILSP camps held in August.

Career Guidance & Work Experience

83 young people were assisted to create resumes and 103 had job interview experience. 33 youth did work experience and 10 transitioned into work.

Tertiary Education Scholarship

16 young people were provided with support to undertake tertiary education, including 6 through the Jordan Wings Scholarship Program which was launched in November 2022. A total of 25 aspiring tertiary scholars were supported to undergo review classes to assist with college admissions.

A total of 21 youth involved in the ILSP program were supported with case management by registered social workers. An additional 11 received case monitoring.

Supported Independent Living

Bahay Tuluyan supported youth to live independently in group homes within BT centers (19 youth) and in community-based placements (13 youth). These youth were supported & guided by social workers.

Young Parents Support Services

Young parents were supported to engage in SEYA training, including by allowing young children to accompany them while training and child care support. One support session was held for 6 young mothers in July 2022.



SOCIAL ENTERPRISE & SELF RELIANCE

Program Objective - Empower youth with hands-on vocational training and generate income to support BT's programs



In 2022 Bahay Tuluyan Nature Farms was spread across 4 sites, and produced a wide variety of organicially grown products while providing 7,315 hours of hands-on vocational training in organic agriculture to 25 youth.

SOCIAL ENTERPRISE & SELF RELIANCE



Operations in Makabata Guesthouse & Cafe were inhibited by COVID restrictions during much of 2022. Although the guesthouse reopened in May, bookings remained low for most of the year. Despite this, 161 youth were able to together complete 18,338 hands-on vocational training hours in hospitality.

FAMILY SUPPORT & REINTEGRATION

Program Objective - Support at-risk families to stay together or be reunited

Family Strengthening

During 2022 work was done to develop tools to strengthen families' capacities to care for children. A pool of 10 families were identified to undergo the first training sesions. The first session was run in November 2022 and will be followed up in 2023.



Emergency Family Assistance

A total of 28 families, which include 50 minor children, were given emergency assistance during 2022 as follows:

- rental assistance (2)
- burial assistance (1)
- medical assistance (8)
- transport assistance (3)
- food assistance (2)
- shelter (2)
- clothing donations (2)
- paralegal assistance (4)
- referrals (4)

Reintegration & After Care

17 children and youth were reintegrated from shelters during 2022. 11 were discharged to their families and 5 to independent living. 1 child was referred to a specialized institution.

A total of 17 children and youth were supported through after care during 2022 - including regular monitoring by a social worker.





ALTERNATIVE FAMILY CARE

Program Objective - Provide quality, rights-based alternative family care for children without safe family environments

A total of 68 children and youth were provided with alternative family care during 2022. The youngest child was 2 years old and the oldest 21 years old. Children were sheltered in 12 houses across BT's centers in Manila, Laguna & Quezon.



Art Activities - Family Days - Character Development - Children's Meetings - Community Engagement - Health & Nutrition - House Meetings - Life books - Sports - Cultural Activities - Camps - Retreats



Most children and youth referred for shelter had survived abuse, violence, neglect or exploitation or had come in conflict with the law. Wherever possible BT worked to keep siblings together sheltering several large sibling groups.

What I like most about this program is that I am not judged. I feel that I have a second family at BT

Beyond their basic needs - food, shelter, clothing, health care - children were provided with a variety of different activities designed to help develop their talents and potential. All eligible children were enrolled in local schools. Social workers worked with each individual child and their families to meet their identified goals and get them out of shelter at the earliest possible time.

CHILDREN'S RIGHTS EDUCATION

Program Objective - Educate key duty-bearers about children's rights



A total of 303 adults participated in 13 training activities run by Bahay Tuluyan, through its social enterprise 'Children's Rights Institute' in 2022.

9 of these sessions were ChildSafe Tourism workshops, organized by the Department of Tourism under its Tourism WoRCS initiative.



CHILDREN'S RIGHTS ADVOCACY & RESEARCH

Program Objective - Help improve the rights climate for children through effective policy and legal frameworks and accountable duty-bearers

Legislative & Policy Reform

During 2022, as part of the Children's Rights Network, Bahay Tuluyan helped to lobby for better laws for children. During the 18th Congress, which ended in May 2022, a total of 7 new laws were passed for children. These were:

- Prohibition of Child Marriage Law (RA 11596)
- Domestic Administrative Adoption Act (RA 11642)
- Increasing the Age of Sexual Consent to 16 years old (RA 11648)
- Instituting a Policy of Inclusion and Services for Learners with Disablities in Support of Inclusive Education Act (RA 11650)
- Foundling Recognition & Protection Act (RA 11767)
- Expanded Trafficking in Persons Act of 2022 (RA 11862)
- Anti-Online Sexual Abuse and Exploitation of Children (OSAEC) and Anti Child Sexual Abuse or Exploitation Materials (CSAEM) Law (RA 11930)



Bahay Tuluyan was also active in leading opposition to DSWD plans to implement a 'massive reach-out' and 'three-strike' policy for children rescued from street situations. These plans were ultimately abandoned.

Children's Rights Reporting

The Philippines was undergoing the 5th and 6th Reporting Cycle to the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child during 2022. After submitting initial alternative reports, and participating in pre-sessions and children's meetings in 2020, Bahay Tuluyan and children's representatives from the Street Children's Congress both submitted additional thematic submissions in 2022. Concluding observations were released by the UN in October 2022.

Bahay Tuluyan also continued to work with the CRC Coalition in various reporting and monitoring processes

Organization wide evaluation & planning was held in November 2022.

Bahay Tuluyan continued to be guided by its Strategic Plan for 2021 -2025 while working with action plans created on an annual basis.

Two key policies were created in 2022 - Anti-Bullying Policy and the revised Child Protection Policy. Both were created after considerable consultation with both children and adults from Bahay Tuluyan.



Processes & Practices

Significant work was done during 2022 to improve and strengthen the financial management processes of Bahay Tuluyan. This included clarifying policies, refining processes and improving the efficacy of systems.

88% of Bahay Tuluyan's budget was allocated to direct program expenses, with the remaining 12% spent on administration. This is well below the DSWD-mandated allowing up to 30% administrative expense.



SOCIAL WORK PRACTICE

Case Management System - Capacity Building of Social Workers - Collaboration & Shared Learning - Database & Documentation - Monitoring & Evaluation

Bahay Tuluyan's social work practice was run by 9 social workers during 2022. Together these social workers managed 64 cases and monitored 35 cases.

Case Management System

A key project of the Social Work
Practice Team during 2022 was to
review and upgrade Bahay
Tuluyan's Case Management
Manual. This process was 80%
complete by the end of the year.
The manual clarifies the guiding
principles, social work approaches
and key documentations,
responsibilties and timelines
throughout the case management
process.

Capacity Building & Shared Learning

Social workers from Bahay Tuluyan underwent a variety of training programs during 2022, improving their skills in trauma informed care, gender sensitivity, rights-based approaches and specialized services for children in conflict with the law and in street situations.

During monthly program meetings peer learning took place through focused case discussions and shared case planning.
